Welcome to St. Dunstan's. We are glad that you are here tonight, and that you have come to join with others in the community for a time of sacred remembering. During our Liturgy, four candles will be lit, with prayers, followed by a ritual of remembrance and the naming of those we have lost in the last 18 months.

If you are watching at home, you may wish to gather a candle or two to join in the candle lighting.

Our service begins with a time reflection.

Reflection Music

At the sound of the singing bowl, all stand.

Priest

I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord. Whoever has faith in me shall have life, even though he die.

And everyone who has life, and has committed himself to me in faith, shall not die for ever.

As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives and that at the last he will stand upon the earth. After my awaking, he will raise me up; and in my body I shall see God. I myself shall see, and my eyes behold him who is my friend and not a stranger.

For none of us has life in himself, and none becomes his own master when he dies. For if we have life, we are alive in the Lord, and if we die, we die in the Lord. So, then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's possession.

Happy from now on are those who die in the Lord! So it is, says the Spirit, for they rest from their labors. Collect The people remain standing

Priest Let us pray.

O God, whose mercies cannot be numbered: We come this night knowing that, even as we are separated physically, we are gathered together through your Holy Spirit. Meet us in our sadness, be present to us in our grief. Accept our prayers on behalf of your servants who have died during this time of pandemic and grant them entrance into the land of light and joy, in the fellowship of your saints; may our prayers bring a measure of comfort to those who mourn through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The First Reading

Romans 8:14-17, 34-35, 37-39

Reader A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans.

All who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ-- if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

A Litany of Remembrance

Priest Let us pray together in our grief and sorrow as we acknowledge the losses in our lives.

Every culture, every faith tradition, has ways of celebrating and sanctifying new life, of marking the coming of age, of witnessing to and blessing marriages, of mourning the dead. During this time, we are finding new ways. We will light four candles tonight, each with particular meaning, but each as a sign that God is working a new thing in our midst tonight; a new way of honoring the lives of those we love who have died during this time of pandemic. The flames remind us that God is always in our midst no matter how we gather or give voice to our prayers. God gathers us as one.

Cantor O God, I call to you, come to me now,

People O hear my voice when I cry to you.

We light this first candle in remembrance of those who have died. We give thanks for their lives with us, for their witness to God's love. We allow ourselves to feel the deep sorrow of death, remembering that Jesus wept at the death of Lazarus. We especially remember our family and friends who have died while we have been unable to gather to mourn.

Cantor O God, I call to you, come to me now, **People O hear my voice when I cry to you.**

We light a candle this night for those of us who are in grief and sadness from the death of a loved one. We acknowledge the pain that comes from not being able to gather with family and friends as we normally would to mourn. We give thanks for those who have reached out to share memories and moments of how our loved ones have touched the lives of those around them. We acknowledge how their death leaves an emptiness in our own hearts.

Cantor O God, I call to you, come to me now,

People O hear my voice when I cry to you.

We light a candle this night for the over 614,000 people who have died from COVID-19, and those who have died at the hand of violence. We especially remember those who have died alone. We give thanks for the doctors, nurses, EMT's and support staff who cared for them in their illness.

Cantor O God, I call to you, come to me now, **People O hear my voice when I cry to you.**

We light a candle to remember that God is with us, in our grief, in our sorrow, in our joy and in our laughter. No matter how isolated we may be, or feel, we are not alone. The power of the Holy Spirit connects us now and always. **Amen.**
